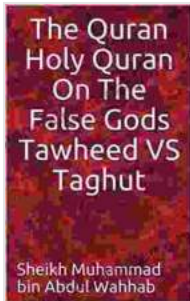

Path to Monotheism

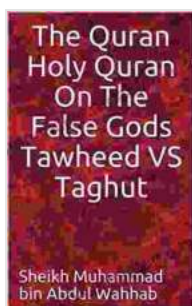
The Quran provides guidance on the path to true monotheism. It encourages believers to seek knowledge, reflect on the wonders of

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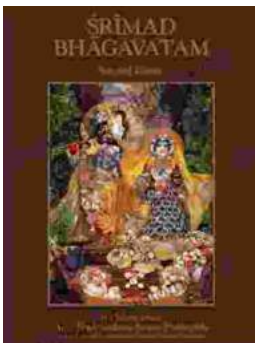
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
